

Provide the physical mobility necessary to support the social and economic mobility of the people of Pittsburgh through the management, design, improvement, and operation of the public right of way.

Department Goals

- 1. No one dies or is seriously injured traveling on city streets (streets and intersections are intuitive to use, even by an adolescent).
- 2. Every resident can access fresh fruits and vegetables within 20 minutes travel of home (without requiring a private vehicle).
- 3. All trips less than 1 mile are easy and enjoyable to achieve by non-vehicle travel.
- 4. No household must spend more than 45% of income on Housing + Transportation + Energy (for any income quintile).
- 5. Our streets reflect the values and pride of our city.




I. Overview and Purpose



DREAM BBQ DINING SOLUTION OPTION 2 - PLAN VIEW


Key Opportunities

- Minimal ROW intervention
- Limits potential conflicts with fire station activity
- Retains two-way traffic operation
- Retains parking space for pick-ups

Key Tradeoffs

- Heavy barricades are required between seating area and travel lane, limiting flexibility once installed
- Inadequate space for 6' distancing between pedestrians and patrons in queuing space along W-side perimeter of Dream BBQ
